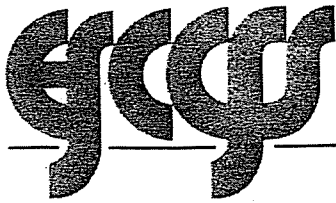

Re.: 1st ESCP Summer School "Cognitive Approaches to Memory"

Dear

As you have heard from Alan Baddeley, I am the local organizer for the ESCP Summer School. First, let me thank you very much that you have consented to be one of the tutors. Indeed, we are delighted that everyone we asked to teach did accept. I take this as a good omen for the Summer School.

Our Summer School will take place at Bernried, a lovely place near Munich on Lake Starnberg, from June 21st to July 4th, 1987. Our preliminary programme is the following:

This preliminary (and, hopefully, final) time-table shows that we expect a series of three successive lectures from the lecturers. Each lecture will last about one hour, with an additional 30 minutes for discussion.

Our daily schedule starts with the morning lecture at 9 am, to be followed by study time until noon. The afternoon lectures start at 1:30 pm. Most important, tutoring groups will meet at 4 pm until 6 or 6:30. In the evening, the hour from 7:30 on will be reserved for either a guest lecture, or for presentations that you, the tutors, or the participants give of their research. (Participants will be encouraged to prepare posters.)


The participants in our Summer School will be young doctoral and post-doctoral psychologists from all over Europe, who are engaged in research on human memory.

I have asked the lecturers to provide me with an abstract of what they will be talking about, together with some suggestions for reading. I'll keep you informed on that. May I ask you to make some suggestions for books that should be ready? (We are going to have a selection of books ready due to exhibitions by publishers & booksellers.) - If you have computer programs - demonstrations, or tutoring software - it would be great to have it here. We will have IBM PC/ATs at the Summer School as well as a Symbolics workstation. Some other computers (e.g., Xerox AI workstations) could be provided. Please tell me what you materials you would be able to bring, and what equipment or facilities you need. Literature selections etc. should arrive by Feb. 15, 1987, before we'll send out letters of confirmation to the participants.

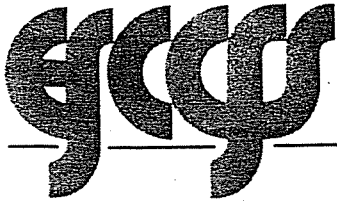

The above schedule has been designed with all known temporal restrictions in mind, e.g. a Canadian-British meeting beginning June 29. **It is extremely important that you acknowledge the above appointments** (insofar as they relate directly to your lectures). Should it be the case, however, that it is absolutely impossible for you to conform to the above schedule, please inform me immediately.

Our preliminary (and, hopefully, final) time-table shows that we expect a series of three successive lectures. Each lecture should last about one hour, with an additional 30 minutes for discussion. Overhead and slide projectors will be available. Please tell me if you need additional equipment (e.g., video or computers).

The participants in our Summer School will be young doctoral and post-doctoral psychologists from all over Europe, who are engaged in research on human memory. Probably you will best know what will benefit such an audience - let me just add that I feel it might be good to include practical hints for research. Some technical advice is certainly essential for those participants who come from countries where cognitive psychology is just being established. (But, of course, there will also be tutors around to discuss those issues more individually and more detailed.)

As for the contents of your lectures, I would like to send all young psychologists applying for the Summer School some information about your contributions. So, please

- send me an **abstract**, or short overview of what you are going to talk about (1 page) - this is to inform the participants (we do not intend to publish proceedings),
- name one short publication, preferably a chapter or article from a widely available book or journal, that gives an overview of the subject of your talk,
- name another title that you feel is good material for tutorial discussion, e.g., criticism or alternative interpretations of your viewpoint, or an application,
- make some suggestions for books that should be ready. (We are going to have a selection of books available due to exhibitions by publishers & booksellers.)
- If you have computer programs - demonstrations, or tutoring software - it would be great to have it here. We will have IBM PC/ATs at the Summer School as well as a Symbolics workstation. Some other computers (e.g., Xerox AI workstations) could be provided. Please tell me what materials you would be able to bring, and what equipment or facilities you need.

Deadlines: Confirmation of the timing schedule, and sending the abstract are **urgent**. They should arrive **before Dec. 31st** in order to have the abstracts ready for applicants. Literature selections etc. should arrive by Feb. 15, 1987, before we'll send out letters of confirmation to the participants.
